- Created in 2010; renamed April 2014
- Works across federal government to align investments in housing, transportation, infrastructure, and the environment to achieve more resilient, sustainable, and equitable outcomes in communities in 3 main areas:

Climate and Energy Initiatives

- Leads Agency Priority Goal to increase number of units completing energy efficient and healthy retrofits or new construction
- Implements the President's Climate Action Plan for HUD


- Leads Agency Resilience Council
- Provides leadership on design and implementation of National Disaster Resilience

Sustainable Communities Initiative

- Distributed \$250m in planning grants to 143 rural, suburban, and urban communities and capacity-building support
- Relies heavily on field-based structure of Sustainability Officers

Sustainable Communities Initiative: Impacts of the Work – Early Indicators

- 13 of 16 Climate Action Champions
- 11 of 14 of the Investing in Manufacturing Communities Partnership communities
- 8 of 12 Choice Implementation awards have gone to SCI regions, representing \$230 million in investment
- 143 of 294 TIGER awards have taken places in SCI Regional Grantees' planning areas, totaling \$1.45 billion in federal investment




Advancing Equity in Public Investment: Principles

- Put equity at the forefront of every significant policy and strategy decision.
- Utilize data to develop a full understanding of the impact that racial inequities have had in creating current conditions.
- Acknowledge the diverse partners that will be required to advance a meaningful racial equity frame for policy, planning, and investment.
- Develop infrastructure, training, and tools to increase employee and resident understanding of an equity-focused approach to planning and decisionmaking.
- Implement agreed-upon strategies that will advance an effective and inclusive government that engages the community and is responsive to its needs.
- Invest in the community institutions that will build credibility and ensure authentic connection to the constituency whose condition is most directly affected by racial equity policies.

Advancing Equity in Public Investment: Principles

- Ensure that the County's communities of color share in the region's economic prosperity.
- Ensure that all Washtenaw County neighborhoods and people are safe and racial disparities are eliminated in health, education, and criminal justice systems.



 - Build America (infrastructure)

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
OER coordinates the Location Affordability Portal
